#### Winchester

Dear Friends,

In September we arranged a Grave Talk tea party and about 30 people came together to talk about death, dying, funerals and endings. It made me think how many of us are carrying bereavement with us each and every day.



It also made me listen a bit differently:

I had Covid last month and spent a few days separated from my husband and knitting. I wasn't ill enough to need sleep or my bed, but definitely needed rest and occupation. So I knitted and listened to the radio.

I listened to *This Cultural Life*, *Just one thing*, *the Archbishop Interviews*, plays and talking books and more, and almost all the programmes had some reference to death.

I heard Michael Rosen (*This Cultural Life*) speak of losing his 18 year old son in 1999, and Nick Cave in conversation with Justin Welby, spoke of the loss of his 15 year old son Arthur (to an Archbishop whose seven month old daughter had died in a car crash). Yet out of these great sadnesses came a more creative and beautiful, if poignant, stream of work and as some stated, a better understanding and compassion for people in general.

My own experience of untimely loss began with a childhood playmate who died aged 17 as his life was just taking off, and the long-term, drawn out loss of my mother to dementia, and I have attended and officiated at far too many funerals of friends over the last 16 years.

It was the late Queen who commented that grief is the price we pay for love.

Looking back as we do this month, it isn't too high a price, in the end, I think. As Tennyson wrote after the loss of a young friend, 'Tis better to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all ...

This month of remembering the losses of the past might have a certain solemnity about it, with All Saints' and All Souls' on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November, and Remembrance Day on 11<sup>th</sup> and marked in church on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup>, yet we end just before Advent begins, with the Festival of Christ the King. On that day we will project forward to the end times when Christ will show himself as having conquered death, when he comes again in all his glory and we too can look forward to being reunited with those we loved and see no longer, giving thanks for Jesus and God's gift of grace and love and everlasting life.

#### For your Prayers



#### **Benefice News**

**Hyde Parish Hall:** The proposed sale of the Hall by the PCC of Hyde to the Winchester Muslim Cultural Association (WMCA) continues to follow the due legal process. Before accepting the offer (subject to contract and survey), the PCC obtained the approval of the Diocese, as custodian trustee, and continues to follow proper professional advice, in



accordance with its obligations under Charity Commission regulations. The sale would enable the PCC to devote the care and attention to St Bartholomew's Church that it needs in order to remain viable into the future, as a place of living history, living faith and living community, and there are exciting plans for its refurbishment in due course. If the Hall is sold to the WMCA, it would enable them to have a proper base for their long-standing and highly regarded community activity, as well as for their prayers. Public statements by the WMCA suggest that the Hall would continue to be available for hire, within its existing restrictions as a Grade II listed building with planning consent as a community centre. As Christians, we share with the Muslim community our ancient roots in faith and our desire to love and serve our neighbours, so this would also be a positive step in inter-faith relationships, for the benefit of the city. In the meantime, it is 'business as usual' at the Hall, with bookings for this term still being taken. If you have any comments or questions about this matter, please contact Revd Karen or Malcolm Bruce.

#### Winchester Churches Christmas Project 2023

This year, Winchester Churches Christmas Project reaches a remarkable milestone - 30 years of helping Winchester people at Christmas. There is no 'one size fits all' - offers of help are very individual, and families can choose what would help them most. This might be exciting stuff like Christmas food and presents or a special treat. However, it could be something much more prosaic such as the payment of a worrying bill or a top up of the gas or electricity. We demonstrate our Christian faith and witness in our help and care for those we visit. Last Christmas we were pleased to have been able to help 34 families (53 adults and 57 children) plus 2 single people - a total of 112 people. Thank you all!

In the days before the event there was an excited flurry of emails and phone calls to sort out who would bring what for our meal. It ended up with two yummy starters over drinks. We then enjoyed two main dishes, a chicken casserole and a super vegetarian pie with lovely crust accompanied by mixed vegetables and amazing potatoes. All was a washed down with white or red wine and lashings of water. A super pudding of pears in a red wine sauce was followed by cheese and biscuits with coffee etc rounding off the meal.

We all felt that it was a lovely, relaxed way of spending time with each other.

We are a relaxed, informal, and friendly group and will continue to welcome new members. #### Update from the Kisiizi Sponsorship Programme - October 2023



I am pleased to share with you the latest information from Kisiizi about your sponsored children. As you know, each child sponsored is part of the Kisiizi Hospital Child Sponsorship project where children who have lost one or both of their parents, are HIV positive or are particularly vulnerable, and are supported by the Kisiizi programme to attend school and to have their basic medical needs covered. We buy uniforms for each child every year as they grow,

shoes every two years, school materials for them each term, and also supply sanitary pads for the girls. When new children join the programme, we buy them mattresses and blankets.

As in the UK, schools in Uganda were closed for a long period during the COVID pandemic, but due to your continued financial support, and our terrific colleagues in the Child Sponsorship team at Kisiizi, we were able to continue visiting the children at home, checking that they were being adequately looked after in their communities, and ensuring they received sufficient food. Thankfully all the children are now back at school for their third term in the 2023 school year.

We are currently supporting 227 children and young people at schools and other institutions. 24 young people finished their studies in June and left the scheme.

Of those graduating, we are pleased to be able to report that 13 students completed a nursing certificate course, 2 completed midwifery training, and 9 students completed other courses from different colleges. All these students leave the project with a qualification or skill that will enable them to support themselves and, possibly, their siblings from now on.

Currently, 88 of the children in the programme do not have a named sponsor, Kisiizi Partners having taken on all the children who had been supported by the Dutch charity, Dorcas, when they pulled out of child sponsorship at Kisiizi. High inflation in Uganda means that our costs in the programme have increased, and we are currently supporting the unsponsored children from the other limited sources that we have.

If you are not supporting a named child, your donations are being used to support the many unsponsored children in the project and we are very grateful for this. If you would like to be linked to a specific child, please ask us to allocate a child to you. Otherwise you can continue donating to support those children without a named sponsor.

If you know anyone you could ask to support a child, please do tell them about us and the urgent need for children in Kisiizi, where 100% of their donation will make an impact directly in Uganda.

Finally, I would like to inform you that after 5 years of faithful volunteer service as the coordinators of the UK end of the child sponsorship project, David and Alison Candlin have retired from the role and we would like to take this opportunity to thank them very much for all that they have done. I will be managing the scheme until new administrators are appointed and using our new email address, <a href="mailto:childsponsorship@kisiizipartners.org.uk">childsponsorship@kisiizipartners.org.uk</a>

#### "The Waste Land" by T.S. Eliot

A performance at St Lawrence Church by actor, poet and parishioner Arthur L Wood (with rare permission from the Eliot estate)

For three nights in October, audiences at St Lawrence were treated to a tour-de-force performance of the poem "The Waste Land" by T.S. Eliot. It was a one-man show spoken entirely from memory and with no prompts or breaks, other than a few short interludes of lovely and poignant cello songs. For over an hour Arthur L. Wood, a member of our congregation, kept them mesmerised. He changed tone, rhythm and location, even climbing onto our chairs, to enhance the passage of the poem. He promised an engaging interpretation, which he achieved, as the audience kept with him and many were very familiar with what is obviously a much admired poem. As they left the church there were certainly positive words and comments.

To round off three very good evenings, each performance was followed by a long Q+A session with experts in poetry and literature from Southampton University and other academic institutions, as well as leaders from the T. S. Eliot Society. These invited experts were certainly much taken by Arthur's performance. Well done, Arthur!

St Lawrence is not a theatre, but our church as a stage suited this one-man show, and the closeness of his audience was a very positive experience for Arthur.

#### Volunteers needed to cook a meal once a year!

St Lawrence with St Swithun parish has traditionally provided one meal per month as a supper for residents of the Night Shelter (now called The Winchester Beacon) which is alongside the Arc (formerly The Discovery Centre) in Jewry Street. We aim to have 12 volunteers so that each only needs to provide 1 meal a year - typically we provide meat sauce for Spaghetti Bolognese, a chicken casserole or even a gammon joint, and it is delivered either fresh or frozen. Our number of volunteers has dropped away over recent years so we are looking for at least 4 new volunteers to join the team. Expenses can be reimbursed.

\*Posada is a Spanish word meaning "inn", and it's also the name of an old Mexican tradition where young people dressed as Mary and Joseph travelled from house to house during Advent, telling people about the imminent arrival of Jesus. On Christmas Eve at church they would re-enact the nativity and place figures of Mary and Joseph in a crib. Modern-day Posada uses nativity figures of Mary and Joseph who travel from place to place, giving each host the chance to create their own celebration in their home or place in the community, and take part in the real story of Christmas.

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#### Tools with a Mission - Update

A few days ago, our first boot load of tools etc were collected by Peter from Andover. See a thank you card and pictures of the items we collected which filled his boot. May I add my thanks to all who have so generously donated.

Peter sends the items to the TWAM sorting centre in Ipswich. Here they are sorted and cleaned and organised into toolkits so that a carpenter, mechanics, bricklayer etc will have a complete set of tools to help earn for themselves a living and sustain their immediate and their wider family. Once ready a container is loaded and sent to one of the developing countries from Felixstowe. In 2022 over 3,000 such kits were sent to Uganda (with whom our Diocese has links).

Here's an extract from the TWAM 2022 report: 'We sent 12 containers from our main Ipswich Refurbishment Centre, filled with a total of over 12,711 tool kits. We were able to send a total of 2,791 sewing machines, 645 carpentry kits, 569 saws packs, 465 haberdashery packs, 231 knitting machines, 152 hand-knitting packs, 183 carpentry workshop kits, 227 drills and power tools, 783 computers, 63 networking kits, 391 builders' kits, 107 groundworkers' kits, 244 agricultural kits, 332 motor mechanics' kits, 103 mechanics' workshop kits, 178 plumbers' kits, 242 electricians' kits, 86 boxes of Bibles, 54 welding machines, and 3,646 miscellaneous industrial tools.' AMAZING!

Already I have another part boot load but there is still time to let me have more items. So please have a

'rummage' in loft, cupboard, shed and garage. It would be great to see not only tools but also haberdashery, knitting machines and sewing machines. You can deliver to me at 83 Christchurch Road SO23 9QY or ring me and I can come and collect.



#### Ibn Abbad woke early (11 September 2001 – "9/11")

Ibn Abbad woke early, put on his patched garment, turned to God and said, *Peace be to us, and to all, this day*.

Rabbi Schmelke of Nikolsburg, when a rich and distinguished man tried to make him look ridiculous, read the forty-first psalm, and translated verse eleven, By this I know that you delight in me: my enemy will suffer no ill because of me.

Father Louis in his American hermitage wrote to Abdul Aziz, Let us have great love for truth, and open our hearts to the spirit of God our Lord and Father, Compassionate and Merciful.

All three went to Paradise, Ibn Abbad, Rabbi Schmelke of Nikolsburg, and Father Louis, and sat to eat at the same table. They drank the water of life and ate the meat of friendship. Whenever their cups ran dry or their plates were empty a little Nazarene came by and filled them up. Who are you? they said.

I am Jesus, son of Mary, Can I sit awhile? Be our guest, they said.

As they sat, the ground beneath them shook, their faces paled and their eyes were filled with knowledge, and with grief. Today, said Jesus, they will hate more and love more, than on any other day since the world began. Hold hands, and ask our God to speak to us in Spirit. And there they sat in love and prayer, all day, all day, lbn Abbad, Rabbi Schmelke of Nikolsburg, Father Louis, and Jesus, Mary's son.

And their silence was more profound than words and their communion was most eloquent and they willed the world to peace.

After a long time they opened their eyes, and there were only three at the table. Jesus, Mary's son, had gone,

had gone to join some other hands in love sit by some other beds of pain pray with some other desperate men break for some other hearts the loaf share with some other faiths the way

and that goes on today unceasing in his care to see beyond the robes of different length, and hue, and cloth, the common beating heart, and to mark again as on the Beth'lem night, the angels' call: Peace on earth, goodwill to all, to all.

David Scott (1947–2022) from Beyond the Drift (Bloodaxe Books, 2014) with thanks to Miggy Scott who sent this poem on the anniversary of David's death, saying "it seems so appropriate at this time."

#### Prayers of Love and Faith

The Church of England's House of Bishops has agreed in principle that prayers asking for God's blessing for same-sex couples - known as *Prayers of Love and Faith* - should be commended for use.



The House, which met in London, also concluded that structures for special services for samesex couples, based on *Prayers of Love and Faith*, should go forward to be formally authorised under canon law.

The bishops will bring proposals to General Synod next month which will pave the way for a process that would lead to the authorisation of these special services. This process, expected to take until 2025, would involve consultation with every diocese and require approval by General Synod.

Bishops gave serious consideration to an alternative legal process which could have enabled special services to be authorised almost immediately - but temporarily. This would still have required a further process for the services to be authorised permanently by Synod.

New draft pastoral guidance will be brought to next month's meeting of Synod, setting out how the system could operate. Further work is already in progress on the second part of the Pastoral Guidance which will look at matters in the life and work of clergy and lay ministers.

Proposals for the *Prayers of Love and Faith* were discussed in an historic debate at the General Synod in February of this year. Synod called on the bishops to work on Pastoral Guidance and other arrangements needed to implement that decision.

The proposals will be discussed in detail at a meeting of General Synod in London on 13-15 November.

At their meeting the bishops agreed that:

- The prayers and readings in *Prayers of Love and Faith* for use with same-sex couples will be commended by the House of Bishops for use in public worship.
- Special standalone services set out in *Prayers of Love and Faith* should be brought to the General Synod to decide whether to authorise them, after consultation with dioceses.
- There is also further work under way to explore further forms of pastoral reassurance and formal structural pastoral provision to ensure the conscience of everyone is respected.

The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, who co-chaired the steering group which brought the proposals forward, said: "The House of Bishops' decisions today continue to implement Synod's vote to recognise publicly the commitment of same-sex couples and to pray God's blessing for them.

"They have agreed to commend *Prayers of Love and Faith* and also considered the best way to authorise special standalone services. Having carefully considering the legal, theological and pastoral implications of possible approaches, the bishops concluded that it would ultimately be clearer to proceed directly to consideration under Canon B2 [whereby the General Synod approves forms of services for use in the Church of England].

"We acknowledge that there are some who would like this process to move faster, however the move to full authorisation will provide clarity and wide consultation ahead of a final decision by synod in 2025.

"I know that for some, these measures go too far and, for others, not nearly far enough and the bishops discussed the need for pastoral reassurance, and for some the need for formal structural pastoral provision.

"But the heart of the gospel is reconciliation - our desire is to remain together as one Church in our uncertainty, finding ways to live well with our different perspectives and convictions."

## Trees, rivers and mountains are gaining legal status - but it's not been a quick fix for environmental problems

As the scale and severity of environmental issues become more obvious, lawmakers are experimenting with new ways to protect nature. One approach that has gone from blue-sky debate to meaningful reality over the past 50 years is to give elements of the natural world - trees, rivers and mountains - legal rights and allow people to go to court on their behalf.

In 2022, Spain's Mar Menor saltwater lagoon became the first ecosystem in Europe to be granted a limited legal status, similar to a company. Meanwhile, Ireland's recent Citizens' Assembly on Biodiversity Loss concluded with a recommendation to amend the constitution to include a provision on the rights of nature.

This idea can be traced back to the early 1970s, when American legal scholar Christopher Stone threw it into a classroom discussion about the gradual expansion of rights and was pleasantly surprised by the positive response. He knew that the US Supreme Court was about to hear an important case on what lawyers call "standing" (whether or not one has the right to be heard by a court in a particular dispute), in which an environmental organisation called the Sierra Club was seeking to prevent the development of a ski resort in the Sequoia National Forest. Stone also knew that one of the justices, William O. Douglas, well known for his environmental sympathies, would be writing a foreword to the issue in a legal journal.

Stone quickly wrote an article called <u>Should Trees Have Standing?</u> elaborating on his initial thought just in time to include it in that issue. Douglas picked up the idea and endorsed it in his judgment, saying: "The river as

plaintiff speaks for the ecological unit of life that is part of it. Those people who have a meaningful relation to that body of water — whether it be a fisherman, a canoeist, a zoologist or a logger — must be able to speak for the values which the river represents and which are threatened with destruction." Though this did not sway the other members of the Supreme Court, it did spark a flurry of academic writing on the subject. Stone became a media celebrity, before the idea of giving parts of nature legal rights faded from the public eye.

Fast forward to the 21<sup>st</sup> century and academics alongside environmental activists have given the idea a new lease of life. It has grown to include different schools of thought, and these theories are now being put into practice worldwide. So far, they have not been a quick fix for environmental problems, but they are leading to some successes. Simply granting rights to nature is probably not a substitute for strong institutions and meaningful enforcement. This becomes clear when we explore the experiences of three different countries.

#### **New Zealand**

In 1840, the Treaty of Waitangi was signed between the British crown and New Zealand's indigenous Māori people. The treaty aimed to protect the Māori people's right to their land and resources. As part of a settlement to remedy past breaches of the treaty, both a former national park called Te Urewera and the Whanganui River have been recognised in New Zealand law as entities with their own rights (although not all the rights of a human

person) since 2014 and 2017 respectively. This has involved the creation of two boards to manage the natural resources, featuring joint representation from the government and the local tribe.

Plans for rethinking Te Urewera are still being formulated, and representation for the Whanganui River has only recently been appointed (delayed by the Covid pandemic). However, a strategic plan will be developed in tandem with a NZ\$30 million (£14 million) fund to support the river's health and wellbeing. Time will tell if reframing this process so that nature itself has a voice will yield better outcomes.

#### Bangladesh

In 2019, the High Court of Bangladesh recognised the Turag River (and all other rivers in Bangladesh) as a living entity with legal rights and required that the government take significant action to protect it.

The state agency with overall responsibility, the National River Conservation Commission, has promised rapid action. But, still today, many water bodies in the country are "dead" thanks to pollution caused by the widespread dumping of industrial and human

#### **Ecuador**

In 2008 Ecuador adopted a new constitution that includes an article explicitly recognising nature's right to "exist, persist, maintain and regenerate its vital cycles, structure, functions and its processes in evolution". This development has enabled landowners and environmentalists to bring cases to court to protect the country's rivers and forests, slowly making this right a reality.

A striking example of this unfolded in 2021 when the Ecuadorian Constitutional Court revoked mining permits in Los Cedros, a cloud forest area of great biodiversity in the Andean mountains. It asserted that these permits not only violated the rights of local residents (such as the right to clean water and a healthy environment), but also the rights of the forest itself.

This is a significant step with ramifications for the future. However, it also highlights a common objection: that environmental matters frequently also include some form of human interest that can serve as a basis for legal standing. Consequently, granting nature rights may be unnecessary. Whether they work or not, some form of rights for aspects of nature are likely to become part of most legal systems this century.

The **Sycamore Gap Tree** was a sycamore tree standing beside Hadrian's Wall on National Trust land in Northumberland. It was located in a dramatic dip in the landscape and described as one of the most photographed trees in the country. The name "Sycamore Gap" was coined by a National Trust employee when the Ordnance Survey were remapping the area and asked if the previously unnamed spot had a designation. The tree won the 2016 England Tree of the Year award.



It was felled in the early morning of 28 September in what the authorities described as "an act of vandalism". Locals heard nothing due to the high winds caused by Storm Agnes.

According to the National Trust, the tree was planted in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century by the previous land owner, Newcastle lawyer John Clayton (1792-1890) as a landscape feature, making it about 150 years old. Clayton was a keen excavator of Hadrian's Wall, and for almost 50 years excavated every year, enhancing the understanding of the construction of Hadrian's Wall. He became worried that it was being destroyed by people taking the stone to build farmhouses and other buildings so by the time he died he owned five forts and around 20 miles of Hadrian's Wall.

The tree appeared to have been cut down with a chainsaw, at the base of its trunk, with a white line spray painted on it just below the cut. The nature of the cut and the evident sharpness of the saw led police and park rangers to conclude it had been done by someone with considerable skill.

The destruction of the iconic tree led to an outpouring of anger and sadness. Over the decades the iconic tree had become the backdrop for marriage proposals, weddings or spreading ashes of loved ones. Seeds have now been collected from the tree to be used to propagate new saplings.

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#### The Washerwoman, the MP and the King

This is the story of how a row between two neighbours in the back streets of medieval Winchester resulted in an international legal obligation, an obligation to enable free access to fresh, flowing water for billions of people round the world.

Winchester has three streets whose names give away the presence of the city's hidden waterways - Upper, Middle and Lower Brook Streets. These brooks, running parallel to the river, were first channelled by the Romans when they established the town in the 70s AD.



Remains of a Roman watergate through the town wall were excavated in Union Street, between North Walls and Eastgate Street (see left). In the centre of the image is the base of a timber sluice gate that allowed the control of water from the brooks into the river.

After the end of the Roman period (around 400 AD) this drainage system began to break down and the town lay abandoned for at least 200 years before the founding of a Saxon settlement. By the Middle Ages, the brooks had

been channelled into open streams down the centre of the streets that bear their name.

In 1299, a row broke out between two residents of Upper Brook Street. A powerful neighbour, John de Tytyng, the Mayor and MP of Winchester, had blocked off the supply of water to a local washerwoman named Juliana, preventing her from scouring her clothes, thread and yarn in the Upper Brook.



This is a wooden toilet seat found in a latrine during excavation of John de Tytyng's house on Upper Brook Street. Effluent from this latrine would have found its way into the ground water and the open brooks.

Juliana sought a writ from the King, Edward I, to restore her water supply. He appointed a commission of residents and based on their findings declared that "water has always been common". His ruling was delivered in the Great Hall in September

1299. The King attached a number of regulations to the commission's report, elevating the findings from Common Law to Statute Law. These outlawed the contamination of the local water supply by dyers, tanners, butchers, human blood from barber shops and surgeons, and raw sewage.

The significance of this ruling and the role Juliana played in securing it was recognised at the time. She was now 'Juliana de la Floude', Juliana of the Water.

The King's ruling, later known as the Concordance de Julian, is enshrined in United Nations General Assembly Resolution 64/292 (28 July 2010), which explicitly recognized water and sanitation as a human right and acknowledged that water and sanitation are essential to the realisation of all human rights. Today it provides a legal basis for

securing access to fresh flowing water for billions of people around the world.

Not a bad outcome from what began as a row between a local MP and a washerwoman on a back street of medieval Winchester!

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#### Charlotte Mary Yonge (1823-1901)

a Revival on her 200th Anniversary

Charlotte Mary Yonge (CMY) began writing stories for others to read in 1838, and went on writing fiction and non-fiction until the year of her death. She can be read, therefore, as a mirror of the Victorian age. But above all, we're now enjoying her novels as 'good reads', with lifelike and likeable characters, believable, unstilted dialogue and moments of high drama.

So what shaped this chronicler of the Victorian years? She was born on 11 August 1823 in Otterbourne where she lived until her death in 1901. She never married and she didn't need to earn her living. Her father had an independent income and the family lived in Otterbourne on a small estate which belonged to CMY's maternal grandmother. From her parents, Fanny and William Yonge, and from her parish priest, John Keble, vicar of Hursley and

Otterbourne and one of the founders of the Oxford Movement (forerunner of today's High Church), she drew her deep Christian faith, sense of duty and obligation to serve her fellow men, women and children.

But perhaps even deeper than that was CMY's compulsion to write. "I must have written", she said to a friend who asked her what she would have done if her parents had forbidden her to publish. As a solitary child, CMY began her story-telling habit early, at the age of about five. She wrote "my great world was ... out of doors with an imaginary family of ten boys and eleven girls who lived in an arbour". These imaginary children were the precursors of the brothers and sisters who feature in her family sagas.

This combination of Christian faith and literary talent meant that she excelled in making goodness attractive. Her good characters aren't perfect; they have to struggle to overcome their faults. Their development over time is also convincingly realistic, and this was what drew praise from her contemporaries, who compared her favourably to the sophisticated French novelists Zola and Balzac.

But which book might a modern reader choose? If you like romances you could start with her most successful book, *The Heir of Redclyffe*, a story which combines Gothic elements - a deadly feud, a ruined castle and wild mountain scenery - with "a tale of love, repentance and redemption." Or if you like family sagas you could try *The Daisy Chain*, the story of a motherless family of eleven children, the Mays, and their adjustment and development through life without a mother. Its sequel, *The Trial*, is a detective story which also shows us what happened to the Mays. Equally enjoyable, and much shorter, are her children's books. *Countess Kate* is the story of a harum-scarum girl who has to adjust to life as the heiress of an earldom, while *The Little Duke* recounts the exciting adventures of the young Richard, Duke of Normandy, and his escape from imprisonment in the French king's castle.

CMY was more than an author - as if that weren't enough. She derived her commitment to Christian service from her parents, and it was they who started her off on a life of service. She was seven when she began teaching in the village school founded by her


mother, although her early career as a teacher was not an unmixed success. She unfairly prompted her favourite pupil, whose correct answers took her to the head of the class, and then lied about it. Charlotte did however eventually confess to her mother, after much agonising - typical of her basically truthful nature. She continued as a voluntary teacher in the school until just before her death at the age of 71.



To CMY church building was another important form of Christian service. The consecration of Otterbourne's church in 1839 was one of the most important and influential moments of her life. So it's not surprising that in 1857-8 she devoted £800 of the profits from The Heir of Redclyffe to building a schoolcum-chapel in the hamlet of Pitt, thus fulfilling a dream shared by Keble and Sir William Heathcote, the squire of Hursley. The school-chapel, whose architect was William Butterfield, the eminent and prolific high church architect, is still standing as a private house.

1867 was Charlotte's next venture into church and school-building, the Church of the Resurrection and its school in Eastleigh. The church's architect was G.E. Street, another eminent and prolific church architect. As managing the project, she donated £500 towards the cost of the building, which over £2000 according the was Hampshire Chronicle [15.8.1868]. also gave some of her late mother's jewels for the chalice. Sad to say, the church was burnt down in 1982. It was partially restored as 25 flats in 2004.

The Girls' Friendly Society offered another opportunity to serve. A world-wide society, this was founded in Hampshire in 1875 to offer Christian support to young working women and girls, many of whom lived away from home. The GFS also provided, among other facilities, a lending library, organised in Hampshire by CMY. As an Associate of the GFS, it was CMY's role to keep an eye on its young members and their employers, to make sure the girls were well-treated. She publicised the GFS and its work through her writing, in particular her novel, *Two Sides of the Shield* (1885) which includes a lively description of a GFS party, complete with a good tea and dancing.

Charlotte also edited the Mothers' Union magazine, *Mothers in Council*, at the invitation of Mary Sumner, who founded the MU, also in Hampshire, in 1876, to bring together rich and poor to build a network that would support mothers of all kinds, as they brought up their children in Christian faith. This was another cause dear to CMY's heart.

Throughout her adult life CMY took a serious interest in young gentlewomen's education, as well as that of her village girls. In 1883 this was acknowledged when she was invited to sit on a Committee set up to provide "a secondary education on Christian principles for girls in Winchester and its neighbourhood". This was to be the Winchester High School for Girls, which was subsequently renamed as St Swithun's. CMY continued on the High School

Committee at least until 1886, and in 1899 a scholarship was set up in her name to enable one High School pupil to attend Oxford or Cambridge University.

In this bicentenary year the Charlotte Mary Yonge Fellowship, of which I am Chair, has been busy spreading the word about her. In particular, we organised, with the Hampshire Field Club, a Charlotte Mary Yonge Day in Otterbourne and Hursley, featuring a performance by the Madding Crowd band of Church music she would have known. Attendees also enjoyed an Antiques Roadshow-inspired presentation of 19<sup>th</sup>-century objects similar to those the novelist would have used, including a pen and inkwell, a silver teapot and a china cup, which last item actually belonged to her.

On August 11th, CMY's birthday, two Fellowship members attended a ceremony in Otterbourne churchyard where, together with parishioners, we laid flowers on her grave. The Revd William Prescott, the parish priest, read a prayer and afterwards we were invited to celebratory coffee and cakes in the Church Room. Later on the same day a commemorative Evensong in the Cathedral included a hymn by CMY sung to a new setting, commissioned by one of our Fellowship members, Ruth Carlyle, and written by David Barton. The hymn was sung as the Introit and provided a suitably celebratory and welcoming beginning to a service of rejoicing, which Fellowship members heartily joined in with.

It is the Fellowship's hope that in this bicentenary year Charlotte Mary Yonge will become better known, both as an important Victorian author and a Christian activist in her own county of Hampshire.

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


### The Captain Swing riots of 1830: Revolution and revolutionary language

While many of us have heard of the Levellers or Peterloo or the Tolpuddle martyrs or the Suffragists, surprisingly few are aware of a shocking period of our own Winchester history: Captain Swing and the Grand Assize of 1830.

The English Project is now embarking on an ambitious new project to explore this period of our history - the society, culture, economics and, of course, language. Tickets are available @ £12 (see link below).

Imagine that it is the Summer of 1830. A second revolution has just erupted on the streets of Paris. People are wondering whether these events will be copied in England. In the Autumn of 1830, under the banner of the mythical figure Captain Swing, there was widespread rioting across almost all of Southern England. The agitation which had started in Kent reached its climax in the central western counties. During the month of November more than sixty villages in Hampshire saw rick-burning, the destruction of threshing machines, the pulling down of factories and Poor Houses, intimidation of the farmers and clergy as well as theft and general riot.

### Update on essential bridge replacement works at Tunbridge, Garnier Road

Winchester residents will be very frustrated to learn that work being done on the old 100 year old bridge in Garnier Road will be further delayed. The road was closed in March this year and due to reopen in November, but the reopening has now been delayed to February 2024.

Councillor Nick Adams-King, the County Council's Executive Lead Member for Universal Services, said: "It is essential that Tunbridge is upgraded to ensure that it can be roadworthy for many decades to come. The existing bridge was an ageing structure, and its replacement is a complex engineering challenge, not least due to the presence of many hidden utility cables."

From the Hampshire County Council website:

The extension to the original estimated completion date of November is due to a number of unexpected issues including the discovery of more extensive deterioration to the existing structure, delays to utility works, as well as significant vandalism from an unauthorised encampment earlier in the year.

Despite the extension of the timetable, steps are being taken to ensure that:

- Walkers and cyclists will still be able to pass through the site
- Car parking will remain available nearby
- Access to the Handlebar café will be available at all times.
