Dear friends

October begins in praise and thanksgiving with Harvest Festival, one of the newer 'traditions' of the church. This year it falls on 1st October, exactly 180 years after it was inaugurated by the Reverend Robert S Hawker, vicar of Morwenstow (in north Cornwall). Passing through there a few years ago while walking the South West Coast



Path, my husband George and I found that our B&B was his former vicarage, full of fascinating memorabilia and information relating to his life, which was a remarkable one.

Born in Plymouth in 1803, Robert became a prize-winning poet, alongside his studies at Oxford, and was then ordained in 1831. In 1834, after his curacy, he moved to Morwenstow, where there had not been a resident vicar for over a century, and he remained there until his death in 1875. The local coastline was rife with smugglers and wreckers, who cared little for the shipwrecked sailors, often leaving their bodies in the sea or on the beach. Parson Hawker, as he became known, was a deeply compassionate man and made sure that the bodies were brought ashore and up to the church, where he gave them a Christian burial. The churchyard contains a number of memorials to these men who were "unknown yet well known".

He was something of an eccentric, riding or striding around his parish in a purple coat, a blue fisherman's jersey (with a red cross sewn on the side to symbolise Christ's spear wound), long sea-boots, a pink brimless hat and a yellow poncho made from a horse blanket. In church he was similarly individual: he always wore an alb (white robe), with a purple cope (a long cloak) and a white stole with rich gold embroidery. Only his socks were clerical black. On the cliff edge facing out to sea, he built a small hut from driftwood, where he would spend many hours writing poems and letters and smoking opium.

His idea for a Harvest service was designed to encourage his parishioners to give thanks for God's generous provision, and the bread used at communion was made from the first cut of corn. 180

years on, the earth continues to produce its bounty and we continue to celebrate the blessings of the land, even though in many ways our lives are now very different. Genesis 8.22 reassures us:

"As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease."

The continuity of God's generosity is an anchor in our changing world, but sadly, the need for foodbanks and community larders only continues to grow. Expressing concern for the environment is not an eccentricity but a pressing responsibility for each of us, while we pray for the day when no-one will go hungry.

Looking ahead this month, we look forward to welcoming Cllr Russell Gordon-Smith, Deputy Mayor of Winchester, to the annual King Alfred service at St Bartholomew's on 22nd October. The following Sunday will be Bible Sunday, and as it's the fifth Sunday in the month, we will gather together for a benefice service.

Whatever this month and this new season holds, may we continue to flourish in fellowship and generosity, thanking God for all the good gifts that surround us.

Benefice News

Hyde Parish Hall: The proposed sale of the Hall by the PCC of Hyde to the Winchester Muslim Cultural Association (WMCA) continues to follow the due legal process. Before accepting the offer (subject to contract and survey), the PCC obtained the approval of the Diocese, as custodian trustee, and continues to follow proper professional advice, in accordance with its obligations under Charity Commission regulations. The sale would enable the PCC to devote the care and attention to St Bartholomew's Church that it needs in order to remain viable into the future, as a place of living history, living faith and living community, and there are exciting plans for its refurbishment in due course. If the Hall is sold to the WMCA, it would enable them to have a proper base for their long-standing and highly regarded community activity, as well as for their prayers. Public statements by the WMCA suggest that the Hall would continue to be available for hire, within its existing restrictions as a Grade II listed building with planning consent as a community centre. As Christians, we share with the Muslim community our ancient roots in faith and our desire to love and serve our neighbours, so this would also be a positive step in inter-faith relationships, for the benefit of the city. In the meantime, it is 'business as usual' at the Hall, with bookings still being taken. If you have any comments or questions about this matter, please contact Revd Karen or Malcolm Bruce.



Volunteers needed to cook a meal once a year!

St Lawrence with St Swithun parish has traditionally provided one meal per month as a supper for residents of the Night Shelter (now called The Winchester Beacon) which is alongside the Arc (formerly The Discovery Centre) in Jewry Street. We aim to have 12 volunteers so that each only needs to provide 1 meal a year - typically we provide meat sauce for Spaghetti Bolognese, a chicken casserole or even a gammon joint, and it is delivered either fresh or frozen. Our number of volunteers has dropped away over recent years so we are looking for at least 4 new volunteers to join the team. Expenses can be reimbursed.

Our churches were all open on 16th September for visitors enjoying the Winchester Heritage Open Days. The Churches of St Swithun and St Lawrence each welcomed about 60 visitors to look around.

At **St Lawrence** talented musician Steve Abley played wonderful, relaxing music as a 'soundbath': a meditative experience where you listen to resonant sounds 'bathing' you as a continuous sound, often using vibrations at different frequencies.

In the afternoon, poets from Winchester Muse read out their poems on the HODs theme of 'Creativity Unwrapped'.



At St Bartholomew's, self-guided tours were available in the morning, and in the afternoon there was a chance to 'Sculpt a Selfie'. Children were invited to use clay and/or collage to make a face, taking inspiration from the skilfully carved and painted faces there, or doing their own. We are looking forward to welcoming you to a world of poetry! The festival this year comprises 25 events combining workshops, readings, performances and discussions, with most of these taking place at **the ARC**, **Winchester** from **13-15 October**. Our festival theme for 2023 is "the languages of the UK", and the programme promises a true celebration of words and dialect for the well-versed and the poetry-curious alike.

You will see that of these events, 11 are completely free to attend (though booking is advised), key events are BSL interpreted and livestreamed and there are "relaxed performances" as part of the programme. We look forward to sharing our love of poetry with you in the coming weeks.

As well as the festival weekend itself there are a number of poetic events and opportunities springing up in the area - some organised by ourselves, and some by the wider community - making Winchester truly the place to be for poetry!

This year there were 1846 entries, 43 of which were entered under our Pay it Forward Scheme. In addition to the UK, there were entries from 37 countries including Yemen, Israel, Ukraine, Haiti. Our judge Zaffar Kunial took considerable care in reflecting on each of the poems submitted.



A GraveTalk Tea Party

Earlier this summer, Lizzie Baron (our Lead Pastoral Visitor) and I attended a seminar at the University of Winchester: *Ending Well - Exploring Issues around end of life*. The panel of experts in palliative care shared their thoughts and experience in order to start a conversation about what 'dying well' means and why it matters.

The seminar ended with a Q&A session. It seems that dying is perhaps the last taboo: the experts were bemoaning the fact that it is still difficult to talk about death. I found myself with my hand up, promoting **GraveTalk**, the Church of England's initiative on this very subject. Maddy Thomson, the Consultant Palliative Nurse at the Hospice here, was most enthusiastic about it and so I found myself saying we would be hosting a GraveTalk Tea party in our city centre Benefice soon! And now we have!

GraveTalk is designed as a cafe type space to encourage talk about death, dying and funerals over tea and cake. I didn't want to have the tea party too near All Souls or Remembrance Sunday, not least as people need to be able to go home in the light. As it happened 2nd September was a beautifully sunny afternoon as we gathered in St Lawrence in the Square, and about 25 people arrived, including a couple who had seen the poster and turned up. We had six or seven facilitators, and a small hospitality team led by Judith and assisted by Louise. We broke into small groups with our cups of tea and plate of cakes, and tackled the questions that were set before us. The Facilitators were taken from our ministry team or trained pastoral visitors.

GraveTalk provides packs of 50 cards each with a pertinent question for discussion. They give us five colour-coded themes within the pack - Life, Death. Society, Funerals and Grief, and cover questions like 'What is important in your life?', 'Is it possible to recover from grief?', 'How would you like to be remembered?', 'What do you think happens when you die?' and 'What do you think death means?' After an opening prayer, the discussion began and it was at least an hour before the conversations began to lag - mainly for another cup of tea! At least one person said they wished it had gone on for longer!

The practical difficulties arise from the acoustics when a number of people are talking (and laughing!) at the same time, but on the whole, by being well spread across St Lawrence, everyone seemed able to hear, and had a surprisingly happy time.

I created three optional hand-outs for people to take home - including a home-grown booklet called 'My Funeral Plan' for us to write down any ideas we have to help our families plan our own funerals, and a sheet with some useful and informative websites. Both of these are available at the Parish Office in paper or digital format. If you would like a copy do ask Sara for one. Sara will also be happy to store a copy of your funeral plan at the office, if that feels appropriate.

If you missed GraveTalk this time, and think it sounds less daunting than you thought, don't worry - we plan to do it again next year!

Quickfire Q&A with Bishop Philip

Philip Mounstephen, currently Bishop of Truro, has been elected to be the next Bishop of Winchester.

How are you feeling about your new role?

Excited, in a word! But also conscious of the great responsibility that goes with a role such as this. However, whilst the weight of history should sit heavy on my shoulders, it's also such a rich heritage on which to draw as we look to the future together with our God.

We understand you lived in Southampton and went to university there - what are you looking forward to about coming back to Hampshire?

My time at Southampton was so formational for me. It shaped me spiritually, emotionally, and intellectually in incalculable ways. So I feel very much in Hampshire's debt, and look forward eagerly to giving back to a place that has given me so much.

Can you tell us a bit more about your story - where you grew up, what were your main influences, what did your calling to both ordained and episcopal ministry look like?

I was born in NE Hampshire, but had a fairly itinerant childhood, moving up and down the country, due to my father's work. That's given me a real appreciation of the variety and the particularity of 'place'. I think it also moulded us into a close, loving family unit and I'll be forever grateful to my parents for the unconditional love they showed me.

My call to ordained ministry came through friends suggesting I should consider it! I went into it with some uncertainty, but I do remember the moment, after ordination when I realised that it was exactly what I should be doing with my life, and I'm very grateful to God for the confidence that has given me.

I've always felt I wanted to make the biggest difference for the Kingdom of God that I could, and in an episcopal Church that often comes through being a bishop. Central to my own sense of episcopal vocation is that I am called to be an agent of hope - both for the Church and for wider society.

Please pray for me that I will exercise such a ministry in Winchester.

The Winchester Diocese is large! Do you have plans to visit the different parishes or deaneries so people can meet you?

Yes! The service of ordination for bishops calls on us 'to love and pray for those committed to their charge, knowing their people and being known by them'. I can't do that without getting out and about and meeting people.

So doing so will be a very high priority for me. It's certainly one of the things that Ruth and I have enjoyed most in our time in Truro.

Can you say any more about your vision and other plans for leading our diocese?

Discerning vision is something that we need to do together and will take time. But I can say that I am passionate about our calling as a Church to be the body of Christ, so that when people encounter his Church, they encounter the loving presence of Jesus himself, made real in word and deed. Above all else I want to lead us in being such a Church.

We hear you worked for the Church Pastoral Aid Society with its focus on resourcing local churches - are there things you learned from your work with CPAS that you might bring to your work here in Hampshire?

A particular focus and passion from that time was a growing conviction that we really are called to be a church of all ages - not segregated into different age groups, but loving, worshipping, celebrating and serving together, as a vibrant expression of the Body of Christ. I'd love to see that become more of a reality in our churches.

We know you worked in a multi-cultural church in Paris and for the Church Mission Society too. That must have helped when you were asked to review our government's help for persecuted Christians worldwide. Tell us about your passion for this area. Are there issues from that review that you see are relevant to our churches too?

Yes, it did help having a broader global perspective, thanks to that rich experience. The call to lead a review for the Foreign Secretary came out of the blue but I've been immensely encouraged by the continuing impact that work continues to have and it remains an enduring passion and commitment of mine: something I believe God has laid on me to do.

As for our churches, I think it's vital that we see ourselves as part of a global family and pray and advocate for those who are marginalised or persecuted for their faith, whatever their faith background may be, remembering that our neighbours are not just like us and near us, but those who are distant and different from us too.

There's been a lot of publicity about the reduced number of people attending churches and the financial pressures on the Church of England. Do you think these are the main issues facing our Diocese and the whole church? What other challenges will you be focusing on?

Of course we can't ignore those factors, but I don't think they should be front and centre in our thinking either. The key, related, questions we have to ask in each and every context we find ourselves, I believe, are these: 'What is our God calling us to be and do here, where he has placed us?' And, 'How can we best express the loving presence of Jesus amongst those we are called to serve and love?' The answers to those questions might not come easily. They should involve careful and prayerful reflection and consultation. But living our life in the light of the answers can be truly liberating, and help us see the Kingdom come a little closer too.

Inspiring: how Jo beautifully linked our 3 readings (Leviticus 25: 8-19, 1 Timothy 2: 1-7 and Gospel reading Luke 17: 11-19) plus the 4 hymns, into her talk. She noted that as "a Christian community we have something very valuable to offer when it comes to a response to

the global challenges of biodiversity loss, climate change and poverty" and "OUR FAITH [IS] IN A GOD OF LOVE!"

Jo demonstrated three ways to approach living more sustainably, using the above readings and hymns:

1) Thankfulness 2) Jesus heals hurt and brokenness 3) Your faith made you well.

Hope: exuded from her talk, and she is led by her own hope for a sustainable future when she sees collaboration and participation in responding to the challenge and where there is space for new possibilities to emerge. Jo saw within the activities and actions of our display on the walls of St Lawrence Church, that we are a community who really believes in living more lightly on the planet, in so many ways.

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Hyde900 at Heritage Open Days

Hyde900 has always taken an active part in Heritage Open Days (HODs), and this year the Hyde900 tent was again sited in the Inner Close of the Cathedral.

In keeping with the HODs theme of 'Creativity Unwrapped', Hyde900 organised medieval tile-making workshops, allowing attendees to create their own tile design in the traditional manner.

Also, two of the Winchester Cathedral Calligraphers, Nancy and Dorothy, gave a short talk and demonstration followed by a chance for participants to copy Old English lettering.



Professor Ryan Lavelle gave a talk entitled 'Playing Happy Families? Anglo-Saxon kings and queens in the *Liber Vitae* of Hyde Abbey.' The *Liber Vitae* ('Book of Life') dates from the mid 11th century (pictured left) and contains a list of names of the members of the community and its associates and benefactors, living and dead, along with pictures, historical accounts, material for church services, prayers and other devotional material. A copy of this important book was on display.

Volunteers welcomed visitors with information on the history of Hyde Abbey and exhibited the finds that have been discovered during the community digs in Hyde gardens. Experts were on hand to explain the findings.

The Captain Swing Riots and the Grand Assize in Winchester

In the year 1830 under the banner of the mythical figure Captain Swing there was widespread rioting across almost all of Southern England. During the month of November more than sixty villages in Hampshire saw rick-burning, the destruction of threshing machines, the pulling down of factories and Poor Houses, intimidation of the farmers and clergy as well as theft and general riot. Orchestrated by the Duke of Wellington, the Lord Lieutenant of Hampshire, the authorities came down hard.

More than 300 'Swing Rioters' were rounded up to be charged with a variety of crimes including attempted murder at an extraordinary 'Grand Assize' held over the Christmas period in the Great Hall in Winchester. The question on people's lips was whether the Revolution in France was going to be copied in England. In the decade either of side of 1830 there were profound changes affecting English society which the English Project will be exploring in a bicentenary commemoration starting in November 2023 and culminating in 2030.

The commemorations will begin on the evening of 4th November in the ARC, Jewry Street. Details to come.

Community Dig 26th - 29th August 2023

From David Spurling, Community Dig Lead:

The seventh Hyde900 Community Dig took place in three gardens in Hyde during August, and attracted over 200 diggers, sievers, finds processors and supporting volunteers.

In all three gardens the dig discovered the remains of the foundations of the Abbey Church and Cloisters, which indicated that the Abbey Inner Close was even more extensive than previously thought.

Work is currently progressing to add the wall foundations to the plan of the abbey, hopefully in time for the Hyde900 King Alfred Weekend from 20-22 October. The weekend will feature a presentation on the recent digs, and an exhibition of the many finds from the 2023 dig. These include a medieval jetton*, an early George II farthing, a portion of a medieval lead ventilator grill, and a spoon from the refectory area of the cloisters.

* Jettons were used as counters when calculating money amounts. They were used from the Middle Ages to the 17th century when Arabic numerals became more widespread.




